- Creates online and print information and materials for potential and current students with the department Project Coordinator.

Team Member

- Serves as an advocate for LARCP students.
- Serves as a resource for faculty and works closely with them.
- Serves as a liaison to college and university advising and instructional divisions including the APDesign Dean's office student
 academic services, Graduate School, Global Campus and Great Plains IDEA, and communicates any changes or issues
 affecting students, faculty and staff and incorporates them into department procedures.
- Serves on department, college and university committees; leads, as appropriate.
- Assists in other areas when needed and is an engaged member of the department support staff team.
- Participates in professional development and lifelong learning activities contributing to the advising profession and the department.

Why Kansas State University?

K-State is located in Manhattan, Kansas, near the Kansas River in the beautiful Flint Hills (featured in National Geographic in (http://ngm.nationalgeographic.com/2007/04/tallgrass-prairie/klinkenborg-text). The nearby Konza Prairie (http://kpbs.konza.ksu.edu/) is one of the largest remaining contiguous tallgrass prairie landscapes in the United States, which provides opportunities for students and faculty to study a rare and protected landscape. For students who have earned a Bachelor's degree, LARCP offers post-baccalaureate Master's two to three year curriculums in Landscape Architecture and Regional & Community Planning depending on prior educational background. In addition LARCP offers the online and inter-institutional Master of Science in Community Development degree, and the college offers the interdisciplinary Ph.D. in Environmental Design and Planning with emphasis in design, planning, sustainability, and place making. The Ph.D. program is supported by faculty from the departments of Landscape Architecture and Regional & Community Planning, Architecture, and Interior Architecture & Product Design.

The 21 members of the LARCP faculty are diverse, caring, and dedicated with a wide range of expertise and backgrounds in academic and professional practice. The students and faculty benefit from the multi-disciplinary composition of the Department and College which provides many opportunities for collaborative teaching and scholarship.

Each graduate student is provided with individual work space and a computer connection to the College Network and Internet. Core coursework is supported with a parallel technology module sequence that teaches advanced applications of relevant industry-standard software. Also located in Seaton Hall, the Paul Weigel Library of Architecture, Planning and Design is an excellent teaching and scholarship resource, and the main University library, Hale Library, is located nearby.
