About

The Master of Science in Community Development provides skills, information and networks needed to facilitate sustainable, prosperous community change. This is a 36 credit hour online collaborative interinstitutional degree program offered by the Department of Landscape Architecture and Regional & Community Planning at Kansas State University in cooperation with the Great Plains Interactive Distance Education Alliance.

Program Requirements

Students may register for no more than 6 credits per semester.

Core Requirements (17 credit hours)

CDPLN 601: Orientation to Community Development (2 credits, fall/spring)

CDPLN 715: Principles and Strategies of Community Change (3 credits, fall)

CDPLN 705: Organizing for Community Change (3 credits, summer)

CDPLN 710: Community Analysis (3 credits, spring)

CDPLN 720: Community and Regional Economic Analysis (3 credits, spring)

CDPLN 725: Community and Natural Resource Management (3 credits, spring)

Additional Requirements

Minimum of 19 hours of approved electives.

Successful completion of a final examination, master's report or thesis, allowing you to undertake an independent project focused on a specific area of professional interest.
