Todd Gabbard's third year studio held an open gallery review to showcase their work over the past three weeks. The project, called ViewSTATION, challenged students to design a small viewing space overlooking one of four sites along the two rivers that bracket Manhattan: the Big Blue and the Kansas. ViewSTATION had very little program: an entry, a threshold condition, and a viewing space with one primary and one secondary view. The big challenge was in the construction of the project's main artifact: a model of the project and site fashioned solely from dimensional lumber.



Rocky Ford Site Visit

For the last two weeks, students have spent almost all their studio time in the shop at APD West, machining and finishing their models. Most had never spent any time with power tools before, but everyone quickly got up to running speed. The spare program of the project allowed students to focus in on a different scale of design decision-making - primarily, how to use the inherent qualities of wood to convey architectural intent. Wood has strengths and weaknesses, texture and color. It can be thick, heavy; light, soft or hard. Most importantly, it is able to be joined through the use of friction and slip joints. dovetails and dadoes, allowing students to comply with one of the project's main requirements: the model must be built with no glue or mechanical fasteners.



Machining and Finishing

Many of the final models were both conceived and executed to a high level of specificity and craft. Students explored abstract representation of their sites, scale and proportion of building elements, and the interplay of mass, light, and space. They invested significant time and effort into the quality of their artifacts, and discovered a new range of modeling techniques that will serve them in the future. The
