We are pleased to welcome you to KCDC this Fall! The Kansas City Design Center is a service-learning program located in the heart of Downtown Kansas City. We provide students with opportunities to engage with communities and work on on-site projects in partnership with local civic leaders and design professionals. Projects at KCDC address a wide range of issues facing the Kansas City metro area, spanning over 23 neighborhoods to explore, envision, and advocate for positive change. Studio projects aim to promote civic design visions that improve the quality of life for all. Student work is showcased in public exhibitions and summarized in an annual studio booklet.

The Fall studio will include both Architecture and Industrial Design students (ARCH 605 & INDD 606). A seminar will also be offered in our space. The studio is a five-credit-hour course with twelve hours of class per week, meeting on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 1:30 PM to 5:30 PM. Specific project details will be announced shortly before the Fall semester begins.
